NASDA GAP TOOLKIT

The USDA's <u>Agricultural Marketing Service</u> and the <u>National Association of State Departments of</u> <u>Agriculture</u> (NASDA) Foundation designed a <u>Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) grower toolkit</u> and corresponding website to increase underserved farmers' access to new and existing markets and USDA food safety certification programs. The GAP toolkit includes new, user-friendly educational resources with an emphasis on GroupGAP, a USDA farm food safety program that provides the specialty crops industry with opportunities to supply and buy fruits, vegetables, and related products certified as being produced using GAP. The <u>Toolkit</u> explains GAP programs, the advantages of the programs, expected costs and fees, misconceptions, the audit process, and relevant resources.

FARM TO EARLY CARE CURRICULUM

Tri-Valley's interactive Farm to Early Care Curriculum was created by Jami Rokala and Deb Cooper when they realized there was a need for early care curriculum that coincided with Minnesota's growing season and met Head Start Performance Standards. This curriculum uses nutrition experiences in such a way that all other developmental areas are expanded upon. Tri-Valley's Head Start and Early Head Start centers support locally grown food as they learn about agriculture and healthy eating in the classroom. Farm to early care has been an exciting opportunity for the children to explore healthy foods to which they may not otherwise be exposed.



LAKE MICHIGAN SCHOOL FOOD SYSTEM INNOVATION HUB DEADLINE: APRIL 30

The Lake Michigan School Food System Innovation Hub fosters collaborations that nourish students, connect schools with local farms and businesses, and celebrate the region's cultures and communities. Applications for funding opened on February 1, 2024. Funded applications will be considered from local food system leaders across Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, and Indiana — especially in areas that don't have equitable access to resources:

- Spark Awards: fund projects that need a short-term infusion of funds for school food system and marketplace improvements, such as capacity-building, planning, and product testing projects.
 \$10,000 - \$75,000 award range; one-year grant cycle, with optional 4-month extension period.
- Innovation Collaborative Awards: fund projects that promote systems-level change in the school food system and marketplace, such as scaling up of programs, regional partnerships, or new program or product development and integration.
 - \$250,000 award; 2.5-years grant cycle.

ASPHN FARMWISE: A FARM TO CACFP LEARNING COLLABORATIVE OPPORTUNITY DEADLINE: APRIL 30

Through a Fiscal Year 2024 cooperative agreement, the <u>Association of State Public Health Nutritionists</u> (ASPHN), partnering with the <u>National Farm to School Network</u>, <u>National CACFP Sponsors Association</u> and the USDA, will administer the first Farm to Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) Institute and Learning Collaborative, called <u>FARMWISE</u>. Ten state coalitions will have the opportunity to explore state approaches to advance Farm to CACFP to increase young children's access to healthy environments and local foods. FARMWISE aims to expand state Farm to CACFP by enhancing capacity, program awareness, Farm to CACFP policies, systems, environments, and collaborations.

USDA'S AGRICULTURE MARKETING SERVICE ANNOUNCES LOCAL AGRICULTURE MARKET PROGRAM MAY 14

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service (USDA AMS) announced the availability of approximately \$26 million for the Local Agriculture Market Program (LAMP) to help local and regional food entities develop, coordinate, and expand producer-to-consumer marketing, local and regional food markets, and local food enterprises. Additionally, AMS has added to the suite of resources available to support communities and practitioners in local and regional food systems development.
